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The Nordics Are Dominating Winter Skiing and Winter Investments in 2024/2025

ver the past few years, one trend has become crystal clear: if you're looking for reliable winters, look North. While traditional ski regions like the Alps and parts of North America have faced unpredictable conditions, the Nordic countries – Sweden, Norway, and Finland – have quietly cemented their position as Europe's snow-sure skiing destination.

But it's not just the dependable snow that's drawing attention. Something exciting is happening in the Nordic property markets tied to ski tourism, and 2024/2025 looks to be the year these opportunities really take off.

Let's start with the skiing itself. Nordic winters continue to deliver, and last season was no exception – consistent snowfall, extended seasons, and slopes that felt a world away from the chaotic crowds in more traditional resorts. For those in the know, Nordic skiing is all about combining worldclass terrain with an unspoiled, local feel. Whether it's the family-friendly runs in Sälen, the dramatic peaks of Norway's Lyngen Alps, or Finland's wellgroomed trails in Levi, there's a ski experience for everyone here. And let's not forget: with over 500 ski resorts, there's still untapped potential for both skiers and investors.

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The Nordics have long flown under the radar, but 2024/2025 is shaping up to be a tipping point. Investors are recognizing the value of regions that combine stable economies, growing tourism, and reliable winters.

A New Wave of Development Opportunities

What makes this season particularly exciting is the broader momentum in the Nordic regions. Northern Sweden, for example, is in the middle of an economic boom driven by investments in green industry and infrastructure – though Northvolt in Skellefteå has faced some setbacks (which we hope will prove to be temporary), we continue to see other cities like Umeå, Luleå and Kiruna becoming hubs for new industries, workers, and tourism. Similar patterns are emerging across Norway and Finland, where improved transport links and economic growth are creating opportunities for real estate development in and around ski regions.

We're also seeing increased interest in year-round attractions that complement ski tourism. Indoor ski resorts are a perfect example – projects like SNØ in Oslo have shown how skiing, retail, and hospitality can combine to create vibrant hubs for both visitors and locals. These multi-use developments aren't just about skiing; if done right, they represent a whole ecosystem of opportunities, from hotels to residential and commercial spaces.

Why Now?

The Nordics have long flown under the radar, but 2024/2025 is shaping up to be a tipping point. Investors are recognizing the value of regions that combine stable economies, growing tourism, and reliable winters. While the Alps grapple with questions about long-term viability, the Nordics offer something increasingly rare: predictability.

At Newsec, we've taken a closer look at the property markets in key Nordic ski destinations and identified clear opportunities for growth. From emerging resort towns to more established areas, the potential for development spans hospitality, housing, retail, and infrastructure.

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








Nordic Ski Passes: Top 6 Ski Pass Prices 2024




Despite rising ski pass prices in the Nordics over recent years, they remain relatively affordable compared to the Alps, where one-day high-season ski passes* typically range from €60 to €100 in the most popular resorts.



Significant Shortage of Industrial Real Estate

In each ski resort, the supply of industrial properties is smaller compared to commercial and residential properties – despite industrial properties being smaller in size than other properties. This indicates a potential investment opportunity in conjunction with the major industrial undertaking in the north.



Rising Prices of Holiday Homes

Average Vacation Home Selling Prices in Swedish Ski Resort Municipalities



The selling prices of vacation homes in ski resort municipalities across Sweden have exhibited a steady upward trend, occasionally punctuated by minor fluctuations. Since the year 2000, these prices have seen an impressive average growth rate of 529% in the surveyed ski resort municipalities. Notably, Åre has witnessed the most substantial surge in prices, with an astounding 604% increase, surging to more than six times its value. Newsec foresees further potential for prices to increase in step with new investments in these regions.

Indoor Skiing A Solution for Snowless Winters?

Since the first indoor ski facility opened in Berlin in 1927, the concept has spread globally, with over 100 centers in 36 countries. Iconic examples, like Dubai Mall's indoor resort, highlight the demand for year-round skiing in diverse environments. In the Nordics, indoor ski centers remain rare, as natural snowfall still meets demand. Many ambitious projects have stalled, and some existing ski tunnels have closed.

In Sweden, indoor skiing is limited to cross-country facilities. The Torsby Ski Tunnel, inaugurated in 2006, was the first of its kind, featuring a 1.3-kilometer track catering to both recreational and professional skiers. Another notable facility is Skidome, located in the Prioritet Serneke Arena, which offers a 1.2-kilometer loop, accommodating both classic and skate skiing styles. It also provides amenities such as a restaurant and equipment rental services. In Finland, many indoor ski tunnels have been closed and it is unclear how many are left.



Norway's SNØbyen marks a significant advance in indoor skiing, centered around SNØ, one of the world's largest indoor ski arenas with 36,000 square meters of snow-covered terrain. The arena offers activities like alpine skiing, snowboarding, freeskiing, cross-country skiing, and ice climbing, alongside year-round attractions such as a trampoline park, fitness center, and climbing gym. Conveniently located near Oslo and Gardermoen, SNØbyen is well-suited for both visitors and residents.

The development blends commercial, residential, and recreational spaces, featuring key landmarks like Luhrtoppen, Fjellhus—the largest office building by 2027—and 3,000 homes in neighborhoods like Snøhusene. Historical sites, such as Skårer Ødegården, add cultural value as ell. Currently supporting 600 jobs across 107,000 sqm, SNØbyen will grow to 200,000 sqm, creating 2,000 jobs. Sustainability remains central, with on-site energy production reinforcing its eco-friendly vision.

The future of indoor ski facilities in the Nordics is uncertain despite their commercial potential. While projects like SNØbyen show promise, many plans have been scaled back due to environmental concerns, high costs, and competition from outdoor resorts...





- The Skistar Lodge Experium provides accommodations and spa services, while Stadium Ski supplies adventure gear, complemented by quick eats like McDonald's.




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Idre Fjäll

- Visitors can enjoy exquisite dining and lodging at Pernilla Wiberg Hotell, making it a perfect retreat for adventure and relaxation.



- Accommodation options include the elegant Highland Lodge, luxurious Vestlia Resort, and the historic Dr. Holms Hotel. Geilo is well-connected by train, has a small cinema, and has been named Norway's best ski resort by the World Ski Awards for six consecutive years (2019–2024).






Finland
